ALICE

The ALICE population represents the individuals and families in our community who are Asset Limited, Income Constrained, and Employed. They struggle with financial hardship despite often working more than one job. More specifically, this population earns just above the Federal Poverty Level but less than what it costs to make ends meet. Over 31% of West Tennesseans are ALICE, while roughly 20% live below the poverty threshold.

The number of ALICE households and those living in poverty is higher today than it was in 2010. In 2023, the Median Household Income across our 15-county service area in West Tennessee was \$50,695, which is \$17,000 less than the state median. The total percentage of households in West TN categorized as either ALICE or living in poverty was 51%, which is roughly every other person you meet. These households cannot afford the basics of housing, food, childcare, transportation, healthcare, and technology.

ALICE families work, sometimes multiple jobs, but still cannot afford the cost of living.

- >> The state's Household Survival Budget for a family of four is now \$80.640 - more than double the federal poverty level.
- In Lake County, 69% of households fall below the ALICE Threshold – the highest in the state.
- Inflation continues to outpace wages, with basic costs climbing sharply since 2020.

FINANCIAL STABILITY

To help more individuals financially thrive, we offer two programs that offer high-guality financial assistance for free. While these services can greatly benefit those with low incomes anyone can benefit from using these services to help better manage their finances.

Greater Jackson Financial Empowerment Center

The Greater Jackson Financial Empowerment Center (GFEC) offers no-cost financial counseling to all West Tennessee residents. There are no income or program requirements to gualify for services. Our financial counselors can help you plan for your future, establish or improve credit, manage debt and finances, create a budget, increase savings, maximize cashflow, and connect with safe and affordable banking services. The GFEC is jointly managed by the City of Jackson and Cities for Financial Empowerment, with offices in Jackson, Brownsville, and Martin.

Benefit Kitchen

The Tennessee Benefit Kitchen is a free virtual tool that screens users for unclaimed public benefits. State residents can text "Benefits" to 211-211 to receive a free screener, which can be completed in several minutes. Users will then immediately receive notice of eligible tax credits/benefits, along with links to apply for those benefits.

VITA

Each tax season, United Way partners with Cadence Bank to offer this free tax assistance program to qualified individuals. VITA-certified volunteers meet and walk with clients through every step of the process. Together, we help West Tennesseans take control of their refunds. Individuals who make \$67,000 or less can also file their taxes online for free at myfreetaxes.com.

YOUTH OPPORTUNITY

READ Team & WOW Wagon

Sponsored by the Leaders Education Foundation, the READ Team pairs volunteer coaches with secondgrade students to help improve their sight word recognition. By volunteering just one hour per week, coaches make a measurable impact on the lives of our students. On average, students participating with the READ Team increase their sight word recognition by over 300%. As part of the READ Team, the WOW Wagon is a mobile library that provides free books for children in local neighborhoods and schools. Books are donated by the community and are available to those in Pre-K through high school.

Mentor U

Mentor U is a partnership between five higher education institutions in Jackson (Union University, Lane College, University of Memphis-Lambuth, Jackson State Community College, and TCAT Jackson) that provides mentorship and college exposure to local middle school students. Participants visit each college campus three times throughout the school year, having the opportunity to learn about future learning and career opportunities.

Tutor U

This afterschool tutoring initiative, funded by the TN Department of Education, focuses on small-group instruction led by skilled educators and trained volunteers. Lessons are tailored to each student's specific needs, ensuring that no one is left behind, and every reading hurdle is approached with creative solutions.

All-Star Readers

Sponsored by The Community Foundation of West Tennessee, the Jackson Rockabillys, and UT-Martin, this program incentivizes independent reading among kindergarten through third-grade students across the region and rewards them for their progress. Participants track their reading with the provided log sheet, then prizes are awarded to those who achieve each mini-challenge.



As one of our mobile libraries, Frazier's Book Bus makes scheduled stops in neighborhoods and schools across Carroll, Henry, and Weakley Counties, providing access to free books and ensuring literacy reaches this part of our service area. We welcome donations of gently-used books.

Emerging in 2018 from a series of articles in Our Jackson Home, which profiled the stories behind unique alumni of the Jackson-Madison County School System and deep-rooted community leaders, Jackson Grown, supported by the Leaders Education Foundation, aims to cultivate leadership skills in the next generation. JMCSS alumni (high school students called Fellows) are connected with local leaders and influencers who teach them about civic engagement, economic development, and innovative problem-solving.

As a partnership between the Greater Jackson Chamber, Jackson-Madison County School System, and United Way of West Tennessee, The Greater Jackson Pathways2Possibilities (P2P) Career Expo is a hands-on interactive opportunity for eighth-grade students to explore potential career opportunities. Roughly 2,500 eighth graders are invited to attend from public, private, and home schools within these West Tennessee counties: Carroll, Chester, Crockett, Decatur, Henderson, Madison, McNairy, and Perry.

This program negotiates discounted prices on medication. Through our partnership with them, we help improve each person's access to medical care so they can live healthier lives. Membership is free and does not require insurance.



Our disaster relief services stand ready to assist whenever necessary. Through our Disaster Relief Fund, we help mobilize a response, assist local government, and aid residents when our community is impacted by calamity. In 2024-25 we provided \$51,333.76 to families impacted by disasters across the region.

At the heart of United Way's mission is the understanding that our future success begins with our youth. Our state and nation are in the middle of a reading epidemic, with less than half of third grade students reading on grade level in most places. To break cycles of generational poverty, improve academic performance, and foster a love of learning, we mobilized our resources to create educational programs for the next generation of leaders.

211 Hub

As an extension of the 2-1-1 emergency hotline, the 211 Hub is an online database for agencies and individuals to find and share resources. By streamlining information through one channel, it furthers collaboration among agencies and enables them to communicate with and serve the people of West Tennessee more effectively.

Christmas Partners

Christmas Partners is an alliance of community organizations that collaborate to provide Christmas assistance to families in Madison County who need help. By receiving applications and preventing the duplication of services among our partner organizations, we maximize the number of families in need receiving assistance each year.

West Tennessee Nonprofit Network

At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, United Way organized bi-weekly Zoom calls with nonprofit leaders across the region. United Way then established the West Tennessee Nonprofit Network to maintain that momentum, share key updates, and continue service coordination for those with the greatest need.

FORD COMMUNITY CENTER

Ford Community Centers around the world bring nonprofits, residents and community leaders together to expand access to essential services, education and economic opportunities. Each center in the global network is designed to meet the unique needs of the community it serves. The Ford Community Center (FCC) located near BlueOval City in Stanton is an exciting partnership between Ford Philanthropy, the United Way of West Tennessee, and several community partners and local organizations.

Over the last year and a half, residents and partner organizations developed an ambitious plan to build the newest Ford Community Center, a physical location with co-located services to help long-term residents of communities around the BlueOval City area move forward and upward by connecting them with services, opportunities, local leaders, and each other. Services that visitors can find offered within the Ford Community Center include educational programming, coordinated access to essential support services, legal assistance, financial education, job placement services, transportation assistance, and food and healthcare resources. The FCC is also proud to host and support community events throughout the year.

The permanent home of the center will be located on the same campus as the temporary facility, in the historic Stanton School. When the renovations of the school are completed, the Ford Community Center will offer community gathering space, a coffee shop, internet access, and expanded educational programming.
